An ancient Greek word meaning 'the right or critical' moment. Kairos signifies a good or proper time for action.

When students have their 'right or critical moment' and choose to engage in the successful completion of their secondary education, Kairos Community College is here to support their decision.

RIPPLE MODEL

At Kairos Community College, we believe that positive, trusting relationships are the foundation of all meaningful learning. When young people feel safe, valued and connected, they are more likely to engage, thrive and succeed. Guided by this understanding, we developed the Ripple Model - a whole-school framework grounded in youth work practices and contemporary neuroscience.

This model operates across three interrelated levels, illustrated in our Ripple diagram:



1. Wellness of Mind

At the heart of the Ripple Model is Wellness of Mind - the belief that for a student to engage in learning, three basic neurological needs must be met: safety, a sense of control, and the ability to experience joy or meaning. When these needs are unmet, learning is significantly disrupted. The brain shifts into survival mode - fight, flight or freeze - making it nearly impossible to focus or retain information.

That's why our first priority at Kairos is creating an environment where students feel physically and emotionally safe. We understand that building this sense of safety takes time, and we honour that time as a valuable part of the learning journey. Supporting students through this process is not a detour from education - it is education.

2. Connection Through Relationships

The next layer of the Ripple Model is the importance of secure, positive relationships. Whether through connections with educators, peers, family, culture or community, we know that young people learn best when they feel seen, heard and supported.

Neuroscience confirms what many traditional cultures have practised for generations: learning is deeply social. Our brains are wired to grow and form new pathways when engaged with others in meaningful ways. At Kairos, we draw inspiration from tribal learning communities, where every individual is recognised for their unique strengths, and leadership exists to uplift the whole group.

Unfortunately, modern education systems - shaped by the industrial revolution - often prioritise efficiency over connection. This "production-line" model may be effective for manufacturing, but it fails to meet the complex human needs of young people. Many capable students become disengaged when they are treated as just another number.

At Kairos, we actively challenge this approach. Every day, we work to ensure our students feel like they matter. We build a strong, values-based culture around honesty, respect, participation, safety and legality - principles that create a solid foundation for belonging and learning.

3. Academic Success

The final layer of the Ripple Model focuses on academic achievement. While our approach differs from traditional schools, our academic expectations remain high. Every student at Kairos has the opportunity to work towards their Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE), just as they would in a mainstream setting.

There is a common misconception that students who disengage from mainstream education lack academic ambition. In our experience, this is simply untrue. Our students are curious, intelligent and creative - they just need a learning environment that meets their individual needs.

Using the latest insights from neuroscience, we design learning experiences that foster neuroplasticity - the brain's ability to form new connections and adapt. One way we do this is through collaborative lesson planning, where teachers and youth workers co-design lessons that engage both the logical and emotional parts of the brain. We use strategies like storytelling, role play, movement, novelty and music to create dynamic, whole-brain learning opportunities.

Importantly, we don't treat social and emotional learning as a separate program. Instead, we integrate it throughout our curriculum, ensuring that students develop the skills and confidence they need not only to succeed in school, but in life.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

This year marks 10 years of operation — a decade of impacting the lives of young people across two regions. While our aims have always clearly stated the importance of quality educational outcomes, I could never have imagined that, 10 years on, we would have achieved 100% QCE completion for all graduates of Kairos.

Many years ago, we set a goal to be Story Changers, Tribal Educators, and Community Impactors, and I can confidently say we are living up to that vision. The outcomes highlighted above show that the Ripple Model is powerfully changing the trajectory of young people who previously believed education wasn't for them (Story Changers). Kairos remains true to its commitment of small, supportive learning communities (Tribal Educators), and we are now consistently transforming not only the lives of students but also their families and wider communities (Community Impactors).

2024 stands as a significant milestone — a moment to reflect on what has been achieved by our students, dedicated staff, and visionary board members. These achievements have positioned Kairos to embark on a new strategic direction, set to positively impact even more young people, families, and communities.

We are excited to announce that we have secured a 30-year lease and received BGA funding for our Caloundra campus — a major accomplishment that will shape the next chapter at Kairos. The Development Application has been submitted to the Sunshine Coast Council, and we are working toward starting construction before the beginning of the 2025 school year.

Expanding our impact has been a strategic goal of the Board. Now that both the Deception Bay and Caloundra campuses are well established, it's time to move forward with new campuses. You may already be aware that we have purchased property in Nambour for this purpose, and our focus is now on activating this campus as soon as possible.

To support this growth, the Board has reviewed our staffing structure and made key changes:

- The role of Principal is now titled Executive Principal, with an increased focus on growth and strategic leadership.
- A new role of State Principal has been created to oversee day-to-day campus operations, staff development, innovation, and the implementation of policies and procedures. Luke O'Sullivan, formerly Head of Campus at Caloundra, has been appointed to this position.
- The new Marketing and Administration Manager role will focus on brand awareness, fundraising, event coordination and high-level administration, and has been taken on by Katy Devers, previously Campus Administration Officer at Caloundra.

The Board has also strategically diversified its skill set to support our continued growth. Mike Jeffrey, our Board Chair, has provided exemplary leadership and positioned the Board to make informed decisions that preserve and strengthen the legacy of Community Youth Education Options (Kairos Board).

Another key strategic focus in 2024 was operational consolidation. Rather than developing new programs, we concentrated on strengthening existing processes, procedures, and offerings that directly benefit student learning. Highlights include enhanced literacy and numeracy tracking with targeted tutoring, as well as the implementation of iVET programs in Volunteering and Hospitality at Caloundra, both of which have led to improved student outcomes. These successes are evident in our curriculum and pathways reports and mark a decade of growth in offering diverse, meaningful educational experiences — truly creating opportunities for each young person to have their Kairos Moment.

CURRICULUM REPORT CALOUNDRA

Kairos Community College celebrates diversity and cultivates an inclusive, supportive learning environment where every student has the opportunity to thrive. Dedicated to providing equal opportunities, the school ensures that all students - regardless of race, ethnicity, identity, religion, or disability - receive the guidance and resources they need to succeed.

At the heart of its approach is the Ripple Model, a holistic curriculum that nurtures students' academic, social, and emotional growth. This includes a diverse range of extracurricular activities designed to support their overall development. Recognizing that every student has unique learning needs, Kairos employs differentiated instruction strategies, tailoring challenges, support, and teaching methods to effectively engage all learners.

Collaboration is a cornerstone of the Kairos experience, with active involvement from parents and the broader community. By fostering strong partnerships with families and local organizations, the school enhances educational opportunities and ensures students receive valuable support both in and beyond the classroom.

In 2024, Kairos continued its proud tradition of 100% Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) attainment among its graduating class. To achieve a QCE, students must earn 20 points across Years 11 and 12 through QCAA Authority Registered Subjects offered at Kairos, with each core subject contributing four points. The pursuit of a QCE remains a powerful motivator, providing students with a clear sense of purpose and direction as they prepare for their futures.

In 2024, all Kairos educators at the Caloundra Campus enhanced their professional practice through a combination of online and inperson professional development courses. Additionally, three educators pursued or continued tertiary studies to deepen their knowledge and skills, ultimately enriching the learning experience and educational outcomes for our students.

As such we pride ourselves on relevant curriculum that, while meeting the legislative requirements of Education Queensland, also connects with the lives of our young people and contributes to their social well-being. We seek to inspire our young people to become life-long learners by providing them with opportunities that allows them to engage productively with society.

CURRICULUM REPORT DECEPTION BAY

As Kairos offers Authority Registered Subjects students are eligible to gain their QCE (Queensland Certificate of Education) upon the completion of Year 12. All of our 2024 graduates exceeded expectations in achieving their QCE and we celebrate our continued focus of ensuring 100% QCE outcomes for all of our students.

All Kairos educators continue to develop their professional practice through a mixture of online and faceto-face professional development courses. This year saw teachers engage in several courses to prepare them for the implementation of Version 9 of the Australian Curriculum. In 2024, we began a staged implementation of v.9 subjects in our Year 10 curriculum, starting with Economics and Business and Digital Technologies. We will continue the roll-out for all other subjects in 2025.

2025 will also see the implementation of the new QCAA Syllabus for Essential English and Essential Mathematics and educators have been engaging in professional development for these courses.

A focus set in our 2024-2026 Operational Plan is to increase our students Literacy and Numeracy levels as outlined by the following goal: 'To get all new young people to an ACSF level 3 by the end of their first year in literacy and numeracy through targeted intervention'.

ACSF levels refer to the Australian Core Skills Framework and is used to describe an individual's performance in five core areas:

- Learning
- Reading
- Writing
- Oral communication
- Numeracy

Our reasoning for having all students reach level 3 is that this is the required level for entrance into TAFE courses as it is deemed that 'Level 3' in language, literacy, and numeracy skills was the minimum required for individuals to meet the complex demands of everyday life and work. As such, it is our goal to ensure that each young person meets this level prior to graduation.

In 2024 we trialled several educational platforms such as 'Education Perfect' and 'Mathletics' with a target group of Year 10 students. These platforms provided us with a variety of resources and students found them engaging. We also trialled a tutoring program for these students and early data indicates that these interventions have increased student's ACSF levels. We have decided to invest in 'Education Perfect' for 2025 and will continue to expand the tutoring program in 2025.

As always, we look to improve on current practices and develop our teachers to become the best in this sector. But of course, no curriculum work could be achieved without the efforts and determination of our students, whose resilience and grit to show up every day and achieve amazing things gives us the passion to work harder and to become better at what we do.

YOUTH WORKER REPORT CALOUNDRA

At the outset, our new Year 10 2024 cohort found themselves in a markedly different mindset. They were beginning to explore their emotions, testing boundaries in search of safety, and working to build trust with staff as they acclimated to Kairos. The concepts of feeling safe, protected, and accepted within a school environment were novel to some young people. However, staff members patiently provided support and observed as these shifts took place. By the start of Semester 2, most challenges associated with their new cohort and change had largely subsided, leading the Kairos Caloundra community to embrace a more relaxed and cohesive atmosphere.

Wellbeing Program Development Quinn successfully developed a wellbeing program centred around three key pillars: Fuel, Movement, and Rest. This initiative aims to assist young people in maintaining a balanced and healthy lifestyle, fostering both physical and mental wellbeing.

Driving Programs Several driving programs have been introduced to support young people in obtaining their learner's licenses and enhancing their driving skills. The educational program RYDA was attended by Year 10 students, and Amanda also led a learner's licence and driving lesson program utilising Murri's on the Move, a grant obtained from IFYS Inclusive Kids, and referrals to PCYC Braking the Cycle. The grant funding contributed to young people undertaking a 3-6 lesson pack with Ray from Right Turn Driving School for ongoing driving lessons, ensuring continued support and progress.

Community Volunteering and Support As part of engaging in the Certificate II in Volunteering, our Year 10 students were actively involved in initiatives with Bonnie at Gateway Care, focusing on providing food and fostering community connections for vulnerable individuals. These efforts help bridge gaps in food security and social support for those in need. Additionally, students engaged with Meridan Community Centre towards the end of the year in assisting with their garden maintenance with the students being rewarded with free access to the basketball and pickle ball courts.



YOUTH WORKER REPORT CALOUNDRA



Health and Wellbeing Support Throughout the year, our daily engagements facilitated many meaningful interactions and interventions. Alongside our Personal Learning Plan meetings, these conversations have been central in understanding the challenges our young people encounter, enabling collaborative strategising and problem solving. The support provided spans a wide range, including crisis intervention, emotional regulation, information dissemination, education, case management, referral assessments, and often a combination of these approaches. Ongoing referrals have been facilitated for mental health, sexual health, and food assistance, ensuring young people have access to the necessary resources. These referrals provide critical support for those facing challenges in their personal and educational journeys.

Counselling and Emotional Support Imogen and Sadie from The Shack have provided free counselling sessions for students who choose to engage. These sessions, available fortnightly, offer a safe space for young people to discuss their concerns and receive professional support.

Networking and Expansion Our Youth Worker team has been actively networking with Headspace in Caloundra prior to its opening, helping to establish a range of options and programs for young people. This proactive approach ensures that support systems are in place for future youth engagement.

Staffing and Student Adaptation 2024 saw staff changes, including the addition of a new Youth Worker, however our students have demonstrated remarkable resilience and adaptability. This transition has strengthened their ability to adjust to change while continuing to engage in the various programs available.

Moving into 2025, Amanda and I are dedicated in providing support, advocacy and strategies that continue to assist to the wellbeing of the young people at Kairos. Through structured programs, volunteer initiatives, and ongoing support, these initiatives continue to create positive impacts and foster resilience among young individuals.

YOUTH WORKER REPORT DECEPTION BAY

As we reflect on 2024, it has been a year filled with both significant milestones and challenges for the Kairos community. Through the ups and downs, one constant has been the unwavering commitment of our youth workers to supporting the students in their journey, fostering trust, and creating meaningful connections that have made a real difference in their lives.

One of the most positive outcomes of this year has been the depth of engagement between our youth workers and the young people in our care. Over the course of the year, there were 1,239 individual contacts between youth workers and students. Of these, 468 conversations focused on mental health, 431 centered on relationships, and 416 conversations delved into education. These numbers highlight the wide range of support offered and demonstrate the trust students have in our team.

What is particularly encouraging is that 63% of these conversations ended with the young person choosing to re-engage, either by returning to the classroom or working independently. This not only speaks to the dedication and support our youth workers provide but also reflects the resilience of our students, who are actively making choices to continue their educational and personal growth. It is a testament to the trust, connection, and the safe space we have cultivated here at Kairos, where students feel heard and supported.

However, as much as this year has been a period of growth, it also brought a sense of sadness as we bid farewell to one of our most beloved team members, Zoey-Brooke. Zoey-Brooke had been a pillar of Kairos for five years, bringing heart, passion, and dedication to her role. She was an unwavering advocate for the young people she worked with, walking alongside them to help them achieve their goals. Her vibrant energy, infectious enthusiasm, and strong community spirit were a source of strength for both students and colleagues alike. Zoey-Brooke's departure marks the end of an era for our team, and she will be greatly missed.



As we look ahead to 2025, it's important to celebrate the incredible achievements of our young people throughout 2024. Their resilience and determination to overcome challenges have been truly inspiring. From re-engaging in classrooms to working independently, the growth we've witnessed this year has been nothing short of remarkable. The strength they've shown in navigating personal. educational, and emotional hurdles is a testament to their character and the supportive environment we've worked together to create. PATHWAYS REPORT

In the pursuit of guiding students towards fulfilling and purposeful post-schooling endeavours, Pathways at Kairos Community College continues to provide support and opportunities for personal and professional development. Through structured work experience programs, external certificate courses, university partnerships, and strategic collaborations, Pathways endeavours to equip students with the necessary skills and experiences to thrive in their chosen path.

Structured Work Experience Program

In the past year, 12 students actively engaged in a structured work experience program. This program offered students the invaluable opportunity to immerse themselves in various industries of interest, thereby aiding them in making informed decisions about their future pathways. Through a one-week block of work experience, students not only gained practical insights but also cultivated essential skills such as proactivity, communication, and adaptability. Encouraging students to initiate contact with businesses further bolstered their confidence and broadened their horizons by exposing them to both unfamiliar experiences and environments.

External Certificate Courses and University Partnerships

Aligned with the subject offerings at Kairos Community College, students had the opportunity to pursue further qualifications through external certificate courses and university partnerships, contributing to Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) points. In 2024, Pathways facilitated students in accessing certificate courses in diverse fields through TAFE, CQUniversity, iVet and other Registered Training Organisations in fields such as Community Services, Hospitality, Animal Care, Sports Coaching, Business, Automotive Refinishing, Salon Assistant, Retail Cosmetics and Health Support Assistance. A further 8 students engaged in School-based Apprenticeships or Traineeships in a variety of different fields from Individual Support through to Business or Sport and Recreation. Additionally, partnerships with institutions like the University of the Sunshine Coast (UniSC) enabled students to study university subjects through the HeadStart program, providing invaluable real-world experiences in tertiary education.

Other Initiatives

In addition to work experience programs and external qualifications, Pathways also focuses on utilising digital platforms to enhance students' career prospects and understanding of their strengths and interests. The Kairos Community College Pathways website serves as a valuable resource in the Career Education short course, providing students with an understanding of their personality and the career areas that they are best suited. Furthermore, the Alumni Facebook group fosters networking opportunities and ongoing support for students beyond graduation.

Pathways at Kairos Community College has forged strong partnerships with entities such as Link and Launch, a service dedicated to supporting young individuals who have completed Year 12 but are not currently engaged in education, employment, or training. This collaboration aims to assist students in navigating their options and choosing pathways conducive to successful transitions to study, training, or employment post their formal education.

PATHWAYS REPORT

As we reflect on the accomplishments of the past year, Pathways at Kairos Community College remains committed to empowering students, fostering personal growth, and facilitating transitions into fulfilling post-schooling endeavours.

The efforts invested in guiding students towards their desired pathways yielded promising outcomes. Among the 2024 graduates, 6 embarked on Tertiary Preparation Pathway course as a precursor to tertiary education. Furthermore, 5 students enrolled in full-time vocational education and training (VET) studies at TAFE Queensland to pursue their dreams, while 2 students embarked on apprenticeships.

A significant achievement worth noting, this year across both campuses we had young people undertake 86 nationally recognised Vocational Education and Training qualifications, alongside 8 students who completed School-based Apprenticeships or Traineeships. Additionally, from our combined 40 Year 12 graduates, a total of 40 nationally recognised Vocational education qualifications were attained, along with one student earning a Credit for a University of the Sunshine Coast HeadStart course in Criminology.

Through a multifaceted approach encompassing work experience programs, external qualifications, digital initiatives, university partnerships, and strategic collaborations, Pathways continues to support students as they embark on their individual journeys towards success.

Kairos responds to non-attendance in a number of ways:

- 1. Roll is marked each lesson.
- 2. If student is not present and the school has not been notified of their absence, an SMS is sent to parents/carers of absent young people.
- 3. Responses to SMS are recorded. Non-explained absences are then phoned.
- 4. We also have a bus service to pick up students in the Deception Bay and Caloundra areas.

For students who may be having personal or health issues affecting their attendance, we also endeavour to connect with students through outreach to support them to engage in school work and re-engage back into attending school regularly.
